# PRESERVING THE PAST. **BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE** Looking to another 145 years . . .

October is an exciting month for the Skaneateles Library, as the past and the future converge in truly wonderful ways.

As we celebrate the 145th anniversary of the founding of the Skaneateles Library Association, we take a significant step into the future by formally purchasing land to build a new library on Fennell Street.

### We are looking forward and looking back.

We are honoring those who came before us, as we think about those who will come after us. The Skaneateles Library Association was founded 145 years ago in 1877.

That was 13 years BEFORE there was an actual library building at the corner of State and Genesee Streets. In fact, the beginnings of a Skaneateles "library" can be traced to the early 1800s, when a group of settlers collected books for patrons to borrow from various businesses or offices in

town. Eventually, residents raised funds for a building to better meet growing needs.

Nickie Marquis, our award-winning library director, carries that history with her as she expands the services of today's library and works with our committed board and committee members to do the hard work necessary to plan for a new building.

Marquis believes that a library is more than a building. The library is a spirit, a vision, a goal, that can and should evolve with time.

Over the past several decades, the community library has become so much more than a building that holds books. The world, and libraries, have changed profoundly. A library is now an important "third space" separate from home and work where we can work, seek knowledge, neutral ground, and conversation, and take comfort in feeling connected. In our increasingly

polarized world, libraries are more important than ever.

You don't need a membership to enter, and you don't need to buy anything to stay.

### Our plan is two-fold:

- Build a right-sized, flexible *library for this community* - Bring new life to our current building while preserving its character and ambiance and supporting our downtown.

Moving into a new space will in no way mean abandoning the old. Quite the contrary. Our plans take better advantage of 49 E. Genesee Street's unique location and architecture and allow for much-needed expansion opportunities for the John D. Barrow Art Gallery. These exciting and fiscally sound plans include year-round used book sales to help support the library and potential office space for community organizations like the Chamber of Commerce.

Thanks to grants and donations, Library Hall (the large, multi-use space on the second floor) became accessible to everyone for the first time in our building's history when an elevator was installed early this summer. The elevator makes story time, concerts, book groups, and other events accessible before the new library is built. This, and other recent renovations, will allow the building to better serve the community in the decades to come.

As the comprehensive work is done to prepare for and build a state-of-theart, adaptable facility within three to five years (the timeframe is dependent on fundraising speed), we will continue to do our best with the facilities we have. We encourage everyone to check out all that the library has to offer — in person and digitally.

With a talented and creative staff, the library is a living, thriving, and evolving place. During the last few challenging years, our library staff found new and innovative ways to reach and help community members. We have resumed favorite programs and have prudently expanded resources to meet your needs.
